NOTICE OF FILING AND REQUEST FOR COMMENTS

D.P.U. 24-103

October 1, 2024

Petition of Boston Gas Company d/b/a National Grid for approval of its annual pension adjustment factor rate adjustment and reconciliation filing for effect November 1, 2024.

On August 2, 2024, Boston Gas Company d/b/a National Grid (“Company”) filed its annual pension and post-retirement benefits other than pensions factor (“PAF”) rate adjustment and reconciliation filing with the Department of Public Utilities (“Department”) for effect November 1, 2024. The Department docketed this matter as D.P.U. 24-103.

The PAF is a component of the Company’s Local Distribution Adjustment Factor (“LDAF”), pursuant to its Local Distribution Adjustment Clause tariff, M.D.P.U. No. 60.9. The Company’s proposed LDAF for effect November 1, 2024, is currently under review in Boston Gas Company, D.P.U. 24-PGAF-GRID.

For customers in the Boston Gas Company (“Boston Gas”) service area and in the former Colonial Gas Company (“Colonial Gas”) service area, the Company proposes the following PAFs for effect November 1, 2024:

Rate Class	PAF (per therm)
Residential	(\$0.0198)
Small C&I	(\$0.0146)
Medium C&I	(\$0.0114)
Large C&I	(\$0.0076)
Extra-Large C&I	(\$0.0058)

Through its PAFs, the Company proposes to credit customers a total of \$19,379,378. If the Department approves the Company’s PAFs as proposed, the Company states that customers will experience the following bill impacts:

For customers in the Boston Gas service area:

- an average residential heating customer (R-3) using 107 therms per month during the peak period (i.e., November 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$1.54, or 0.6 percent;

- an average residential heating customer (R-3) using 23 therms per month during the off-peak period (i.e., May 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.33, or 0.8 percent;
- an average residential non-heating customer (R-1) using 14 therms per month during the peak period (i.e., November 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.20, or 0.4 percent;
- an average residential non-heating customer (R-1) using 8 therms per month during the off-peak period (i.e., May 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.11, or 0.4 percent;
- an average low-income heating customer (R-4) using 106 therms per month during the peak period (i.e., November 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$1.14, or 0.6 percent;
- an average low-income heating customer (R-4) using 25 therms per month during the off-peak period (i.e., May 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.28, or 0.8 percent;
- an average low-income non-heating customer (R-2) using 18 therms per month during the peak period (i.e., November 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.20, or 0.4 percent;
- an average low-income non-heating customer (R-2) using 10 therms per month during the off-peak period (i.e., May 1, 2025 and October 31, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.11, or 0.5 percent; and
- C&I bill impacts will vary. For specific bill impacts, these customers should contact the Company as shown below.

The Company has proposed other changes to its rates effective November 1, 2024 in D.P.U. 24-PGAF-GRID, which will also have an impact on customers' bills.

For customers in the former Colonial Gas service area:

- an average residential heating customer (R-3) using 107 therms per month during the peak period (i.e., November 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$1.54, or 0.7 percent;
- an average residential heating customer (R-3) using 23 therms per month during the off-peak period (i.e., May 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.33, or 0.8 percent;

- an average residential non-heating customer (R-1) using 14 therms per month during the peak period (i.e., November 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.21, or 0.4 percent;
- an average residential non-heating customer (R-1) using 8 therms per month during the off-peak period (i.e., May 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.12, or 0.5 percent;
- an average low-income heating customer (R-4) using 106 therms per month during the peak period (i.e., November 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$1.14, or 0.7 percent;
- an average low-income heating customer (R-4) using 25 therms per month during the off-peak period (i.e., May 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.28, or 0.9 percent;
- an average low-income non-heating customer (R-2) using 18 therms per month during the peak period (i.e., November 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.19, or 0.4 percent;
- an average low-income non-heating customer (R-2) using 10 therms per month during the off-peak period (i.e., May 1, 2025 and October 31, 2025) will experience an average monthly bill decrease of \$0.11, or 0.5 percent; and
- C&I bill impacts will vary. For specific bill impacts, these customers should contact the Company as shown below.

The Company has proposed other changes to its rates effective November 1, 2024 in D.P.U. 24-PGAF-GRID, which will also have an impact on customers' bills.

Any person who desires to participate otherwise in the evidentiary phase of this proceeding shall file a petition for leave to intervene no later than 5:00 p.m. on **Tuesday, October 15, 2024**. A petition for leave to intervene must satisfy the timing and substantive

requirements of 220 CMR 1.03. Receipt by the Department constitutes filing and determines whether a petition has been timely filed. A petition filed late may be disallowed as untimely, unless good cause is shown for waiver under 220 CMR 1.01(4). To be allowed, a petition under 220 CMR 1.03(1) must satisfy the standing requirements of G.L. c. 30A § 10. All responses to petitions to intervene must be filed by the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on the second business day after the petition to intervene was filed.

To the extent a person or entity wishes to submit comments or a petition to intervene in accordance with this Notice, electronic submission is sufficient. All documents should be submitted to the Department in **.pdf format** by email attachment to dpu.efiling@mass.gov and katherine.e.stock@mass.gov. In addition, one copy of all written comments and petitions to intervene should be emailed to the Company's attorney, Joseph Dorfler, Esq. at jdorfler@richmaylaw.com.
